Components

Take-Home Book

Family Letter

A letter introducing the collection and its goals to families, including activities and prompts

Classroom Books


Four books aligned to each of the five SEL themes (2 copies each for paired reading; 40 books in total)

Book Bins

Containers for organizing the books by SEL theme

SEL Themes

The key ideas explored in this collection are based on five basic social-emotional learning themes.

How to Use the Collection

Take-Home Book

- To begin, read the take-home book together with your class.
- Let children know that they get to keep the book, and that they can read it together with their families.

Family Letter

- Send the family letter home with the take-home book.
- Encourage children to have a family member fill out the prompts on the back of the letter and bring it back in.

Classroom Books

- Use the stickers and book list provided to label each book by theme.
- Organize the books in the bins according to theme.

Suggested Strategies

Each strategy is designed to reinforce multiple SEL themes indicated by the labels below.

Favorite Character

After a story has been read aloud, ask the students to identify their favorite characters. Which characters tried to help someone? Was there a character who needed to work harder at being a good friend?

Good or Not-So-Good Idea?

Create construction paper cut-outs with a happy face on one side and a frowny face on the other. Read a book to the class. Pause whenever a character must make a choice and ask children to vote by raising the happy or frowny side of their signs. Is the choice a good idea, or a not-so-good one? Ask students to explain why or why not.
