4 Things the Student Can Do INDEPENDENTLY:

Examples include:

- Follow a dramatic play sequence to engage with peers.
- Solve varied story problems by accurately visualizing the actions in the problems.
- Use tools to write complete sentences.
- Use the schedule and routine to anticipate social and academic expectations.

3 Things the Student is BEGINNING to Do:

Examples include:

- Monitor his reading (persevere through longer words and self-correct).
- Write her name.
- Count objects showing 1:1 correspondence.

2 Things the Student Can Do WITH SUPPORT:

Examples include:

- Sustain attention to independent work.
- Participate in academic class discussions and group learning, sustaining her attention to the topic.

During the School Year (Fall, Winter, or Spring), We Will Be Focusing On (list 2-4 skills):

Examples include:

- Continuing to develop skills to think flexibly and problem-solve confidently.
- Using technology to support her growth as a writer.
- Focusing on the skills of fluency and phrasing as a reader.

Key Accommodations We Use in the Classroom (list 2–4 accommodations that are essential for the student):

Examples include:

- Multi-step tasks broken into visual and simplified steps, with adult or peer modeling.
- Minimal language for redirection and reminders.
