## Action Planning

Reading improvement action plans include determining specific tasks, identifying who will do each task, mapping out a timeline, articulating a plan for progress monitoring, and setting a goal for the future.

This is where all of your assessment data and your knowledge of evidence-based instruction come together. Linking instruction to student needs is one of the most effective actions you can take.

The space between knowing better and doing better is filled with the many realities of school life. Rather than ignoring reality, we recommend embracing and planning for it. The best intervention and action plans include support for doing what you planned, not assuming the plan will be implemented.

The chart below shows the main components to include in your action plan.
