

Dear Educator,

The Byron V. Garrett Life and Literacy Skills Library offers books for PreK to Grade 5. For each grade, the library features lively, appealing books perfect for read-alouds, paired reading, and independent reading that have been selected because they demonstrate the importance of key life skills. These library books have been categorized into five distinct themes, with an additional take-home book that encompasses all themes.

Your Grade 1 Library includes: 1 Take-Home/Whole-Class title per grade, 31 copies of each, and 20 high-interest trade books, 2 copies of each.

Take-Home Book



Jabari Tries

written and illustrated by Gaia Cornwall

Jabari is determined to build a fantastic machine that can fly across the whole backyard. He insists he can do it alone. But when his machine crashes and Jabari gets frustrated, his father teaches him ways to calm down and refocus. He also suggests Jabari tries working with a partner: his little sister, Nika. *Jabari Tries* is a gentle story about keeping calm in the face of a problem, and the good things that can happen when people work together. This book relates to all five library themes and is supported by both a Read-Aloud Lesson resource for teachers to use in the classroom as well as a Read Together resource for families to share with children at home.

Talk About It: What special advice does Jabari's father give him?




Just Ask!: Be Different, Be Brave, Be You

In this vibrant picture book, Sonia Sotomayor uses her lived experience with juvenile diabetes to teach readers about people with chronic illnesses and disabilities. As the characters introduce themselves while they work together in a garden, they share some of the things that are unique to their own experiences. As Sonia Sotomayor shares, "Each of us grows in our own way," and this book celebrates that.

Talk About it: Why is it important to learn about the people around you? What's something important you want people to know about you?



Ravi's Roar

written and illustrated by Tom Percival


Ravi is known for being small in his family, and he doesn't mind one bit—that is until he can't reach the monkey bars or go on the slide. Then Ravi becomes a tiger! Tigers can do anything that the regular Ravi can't. But will people want to do things with him now that he's a tiger? Ravi must learn about his own feelings and abilities.

Talk About It: How does becoming a tiger make Ravi feel? How does that change by the end of the book? Why is it better for Ravi to not become a tiger?

Red: A Crayon's Story

written and illustrated by Michael Hall

Even though Red is called Red and has a red label, he is actually a blue crayon. His family, teachers, and friends try to help him act like "red," but nothing seems to work. Red just cannot be red. It's only after he accepts that he's blue that he learns the value of being true to who he is.

Talk About It: Why do you think Red tries so hard to be red instead of what he is: blue? What would you do if people expected you to be completely different from who you are?



The Greatest Adventure

written and illustrated by Tony Piedra

Eliot imagines sailing wild rivers and discovering giant beasts, right on his street! But he wishes his adventures were real. Eliot's grandpa, El Capitán, once steered his own ship through dangerous seas to far-off lands. Now his ship is no longer seaworthy. Eliot and El Capitán tap into their own creativity to find new adventures they can share. Tony Piedra's illustrations add both humor and excitement to this clever story.

Talk About It: Why do you think Eliot wants adventure so much? How might spending time with his grandfather feel like a whole new, real adventure?

Alma and How She Got Her Name


written and illustrated by Juana Martinez-Neal

Alma Sofia Esperanza José Pura Candela tells her dad that she thinks her name is much too long. He responds by explaining the significance of each of her names, linking them to specific and special family members who came before her. Along the way, Alma develops a stronger sense of herself and an interest in where and who she came from, and she delights in the stories of the many people her name carries. Now it's up to her to create her own story!

Talk About It: What have you learned from Alma about being proud of who you are? What does it mean to create your own story?

Fox Is Late

Fox is late! But what is he late for? And why is he zooming everywhere on his skateboard doing fancy tricks? Despite the animals chasing him, Fox remains cool under pressure and organizes a wonderful lunch for his animal friends.

Talk About It: Fox has a plan. What does he expect his friends to do?



The Good Egg

written by Jory John and illustrated by Pete Oswald

The good egg is very kind and considerate, and is always willing to help. This becomes more difficult when all the other eggs around him aren't as good. In trying to be perfect while also trying to change the other eggs, the good egg has gotten cracks in his shell! He must learn that it's okay to not be perfect, and that taking care of yourself is a part of being a good egg.

Talk About It: Why do you think the good egg is finally able to play and spend time with the other eggs without getting upset?



Ty's Travels: Lab Magic

Ty and his brother Corey love participating in the science experiments at the museum. But this time, Ty is too little to participate in the experiment. Ty and Corey learn that there are more things than just the experiments to take part in at the museum, and that these other activities can be just as exciting.

Talk About It: Why do you think Corey is happy to give up going to the science lab in order to spend time with Ty doing things they both can do?




Big Red Lollipop

When Rubina is invited to a party, she is forced to take Sana, her little sister. Sana ruins any chance of Rubina getting invited out again. She also eats Rubina's lollipop from the party! When it's Sana's turn to be forced to take a younger sibling, Rubina must make a choice on whether or not she will allow Sana go through the same things she went through. This book showcases the importance of learning to extend empathy to others, even when it is not given to you.

Talk About It: Do you think Rubina handles her sister ruining the party and her lollipop well? How do you think you would have reacted if someone did that to you?




Harlem Grown

In this story based on actual events, Nevaeh tells how Mr. Tony came to her city's school and helped the students turn a vacant lot into a beautiful and functional farm. Their first attempt failed, but they researched and tried again with new plants and new techniques. Eventually they turned the lot into something beautiful and useful while learning about healthy, sustainable eating and collaboration.

Talk About It: Mr. Tony is a leader, but the whole school works together to create the farm. How does Nevaeh feel about helping on the farm? How might working together with others help you feel like you are a part of something important?



How Full Is Your Bucket? For Kids


written by Tom Rath and Mary Reckmeyer and illustrated by Maurie J. Manning


I Am Respectful

Boy and Bot meet in the forest and immediately become friends. They play and spend time together until suddenly Bot switches off. Boy tries everything he can think of, but nothing works, and eventually he falls asleep—which is when Bot wakes up and sees Boy "shut down"! This hilarious book about a simple misunderstanding will have readers grinning from ear to ear.

Talk About It: How did Boy try to take care of Bot? How did Bot try to take care of Boy? What kinds of things do you and your friends do to try to help each other?



Friendly Frenzy


written and illustrated by Tedd Arnold

Talk About It: Why is it important to Ruby that she is the first? Why is she excited for more children to come after her?




Miguel's Community Garden




I Want to Be an Engineer
