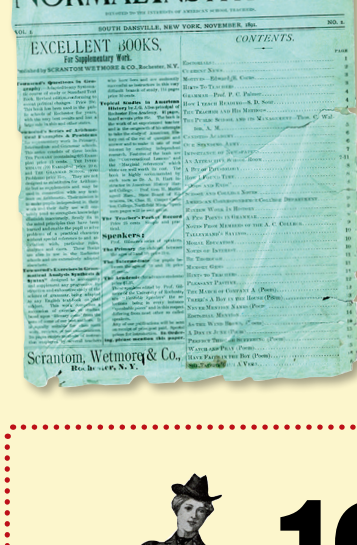


THE HISTORY OF **Teacher**

F. A. Owen publishes the first issue of **Normal Instructor**.

(Fun fact: "Normal school" was the term for teachers' colleges at the time.)

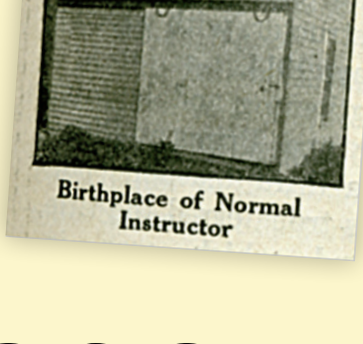


1903

"Remember, you are a lady before you are a teacher. In your pocket should be a pure Irish linen hand-stitched handkerchief."

1916

Normal Instructor unveils the original South Dansville, New York, digs.



1920s

Normal Instructor becomes **Normal Instructor and Primary Plans**.

1926

Special Addition: Storybook poster patterns!



1930s

Normal Instructor and Primary Plans becomes **The Instructor**.

1950s

Scandal:

"Betty Parent's Diary," a column in which a mom dishes about her child's school, causes many teachers to write in thinking the gossip is about them!



1965

The Instructor switches hands from Mary Owen (daughter of F. A.) to Betty Noon, a longtime employee.

1980s

The Instructor is rebranded as **Instructor and Teacher**.

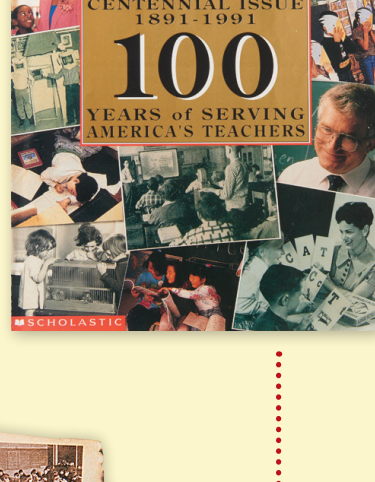


1990

Renamed **Instructor**, this is the first issue produced by Scholastic, led by CEO Dick Robinson and editor-in-chief John Lent.

1991

The 100th anniversary issue is the first to be fully produced on a computer! Lent says, "There were moments when it seemed impossible to predict the results, and that was exciting."

Instructor celebrates 115 years of teaching ideas.



2015

Instructor becomes **Scholastic Teacher!**
