


A GOD IS BORN

Jealous Hera throws a fit, but a little island saves the day.

Apollo and his twin sister, Artemis, were born on the island of Delos, the only place that would allow their mother, Leto, to give birth. That's because Zeus was the the daddy of Leto's twins, which didn't please his wife, the goddess Hera, at all! In fact she forbade the birth to take place on land or anywhere the sun shone. Fortunately Poseidon, the god of the sea and Apollo's uncle, revealed a small bit of the island that had been covered with water (the Greek word delos means "visible"). As soon as Apollo was born, he was fed nectar and ambrosia, and within a day he had become a full-grown god!



REALITY CHECK

Is there really an island of Delos? Yes! Delos is in the Aegean Sea, near the island of Mykonos. The Greeks considered it sacred, and built temples and statues there honoring the gods.

THE ORACLE AT DELPHI

Apollo finds a spot for his temple, slays a dragon, and sets up shop at Delphi.

As the god of prophecy, or predicting the future, Apollo needed a temple where mortals could ask him questions. He found the perfect spot at Pytho-well, perfect after he killed a horrible dragon that lived there. Apollo's answers were spoken through the Pythia, or priestess of the temple. (The term Pythia resembles the Greek word for "rot," which is what the dead dragon did.) Pytho later came to be known



Python was born out of the slime after a major flood in Delphi.

The temple contained:

- a golden statue of Apollo
- the omphalos
- the supposed tomb of Dionysus
- a deep chasm, on top of which sat a tripod.

The Pythia sat on the tripod, drinking water from a nearby sacred spring, chewing laurel leaves, and shaking a laurel branch.

REALITY CHECK

Was there really a Temple of Apollo? Not was. Is! The ruins of Apollo's temple at Delphi can still be seen today, on the slopes of Mount Parnassus in Greece.






Daphne makes like a tree and leaves-for good!





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

The Birth of Venus was painted by Italian artist Sandro Botticelli around 1483. It shows the love goddess Aphrodite (her Roman name is Venus) rising out of the sea on a shell. This painting explains why Aphrodite is sometimes called "Venus on the Half-Shell."

SEA FOAM **SWEETHEART**

The goddess of love steps out of the sea in a froth of foam.

A goddess as gorgeous as Aphrodite was too special to be born in an ordinary way. After the Titan Cronus mutilated his father, Uranus (the sky), he threw some of Uranus's body parts into the sea. The waters began

to foam and froth. Suddenly, from the foam rose the beautiful goddess of love, Aphrodite. The waves carried her to the island of Cyprus, and as Aphrodite stepped onto land, flowers sprang up beneath her feet. Now that's what you call making an entrance!

All the gods and goddesses were gathered at a wedding, except for one: Eris, the goddess of discord. Annoved that she hadn't been invited, Eris started trouble by tossing a golden apple marked "For the Most Beautiful" into the reception. The goddesses Aphrodite, Hera, and Athena each claimed that the apple was intended for her, and they began to argue. The mighty god Zeus decided that Paris, prince of Troy, should settle the argument by judging a beauty contest. Each goddess contestant offered Paris a bribe, hoping that he would choose

her as the most beautiful. Paris couldn't resist Aphrodite's offer: She promised to make him irresistible to Helen, the most beautiful woman in the world. Helen was already married to Menelaus, king of Sparta, but that didn't stop Paris. The prince kidnapped Helen and took her to Troy. The Greek hero Agamemnon led an expedition to rescue Helen, igniting the Trojan War.

Sons of the love goddess share the love.

The goddess of love was always accompanied by her sons Eros and Himeros. Eros (Roman, Cupid) is the better known of the two: He was the god of love. With his gold-tipped arrows he could arouse love in anyone he chose to shoot-god or mortal. But Eros also had leadtipped arrows that could inspire loathing. Himeros was the god of longing. He, too, had a bow and arrows that he used on gods and mortals. Unlike Eros, Himeros was a minor god who was paid little attention by mortals except for those he shot.


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
