Writing About the Great Outdoors

Inspire your students to research the importance of outdoor spaces and create a persuasive essay about why the outdoors matter.

Objective

Students will apply persuasive writing techniques as well as support an opinion or claim with facts or evidence.

Time

40-60 minutes

Materials

- Write to Persuade! activity sheet
- Contest entry form
- Internet access or printed articles for research

Instructions


- Spark a class discussion about the importance of the outdoors. Ask:
 - ► What are your favorite activities to do outside?
 - ► How do you feel when you're outside?
- Tell students that our country has thousands of outdoor places that everyone can use, such as national and state parks, local gardens and parks, and more. Ask: How would life be different if people couldn't visit outdoor spaces?
- **3** Explain that our local, state, and federal governments manage and maintain a lot of our outdoor spaces. Tell students that they'll write a persuasive essay to a government official about why outdoor spaces are important. Ask: *Have you ever persuaded someone to agree with you? How?*
- A Remind students that the most effective persuasive arguments use one or more of the following strategies: using facts, showing emotion, and/or citing trusted experts or sources. Show examples of each strategy using "Our family should adopt a dog" as the starting point. For example:
 - ► Fact Dogs need exercise.
 - ► Emotion Imagine how happy we'll feel tossing a ball to our dog.
 - ► Trusted experts/sources
 Researchers at the Centers
 for Disease Control and Prevention
 say that having pets has many
 benefits, like lowering stress.



Have students research what experts say about the outdoors, and ways they can become further involved (such as exploring a forest, being a junior ranger, or learning about plants and pollinators) using the government websites fs.fed.us/learn/kids and nps.gov/kids/index.cfm.

Distribute the Write to Persuade! activity sheet to the class. Once students have completed their sheets, instruct them to use their notes to write a persuasive essay about the importance of outdoor spaces. Have students write their essays on a separate 8 ½ x 11 inch piece of paper (no more than two pages).

Point out that the activity sheet asks them to brainstorm ideas for an illustration. Discuss how art, like words, can persuade by sparking an emotion or sending a message. Instruct them to create an illustration related to their essay on the entry form. Submit essays with completed entry forms to scholastic.com/outdoorsallianceforkids. by the April 19 deadline.
