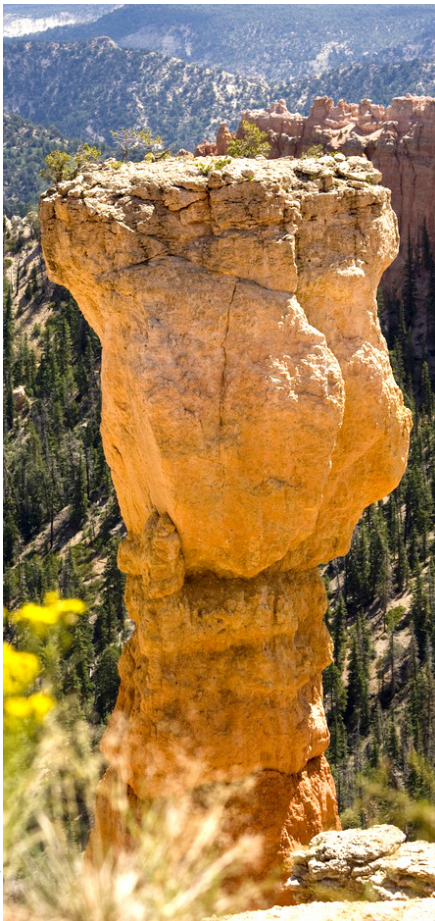
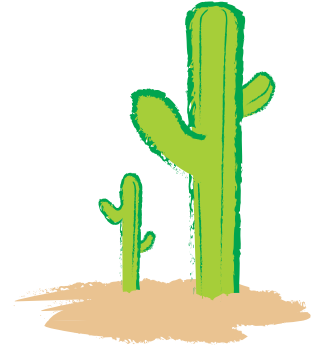


UTAH: Bryce Canyon National Park Activity

What do you think these two famous hoodoos look like?



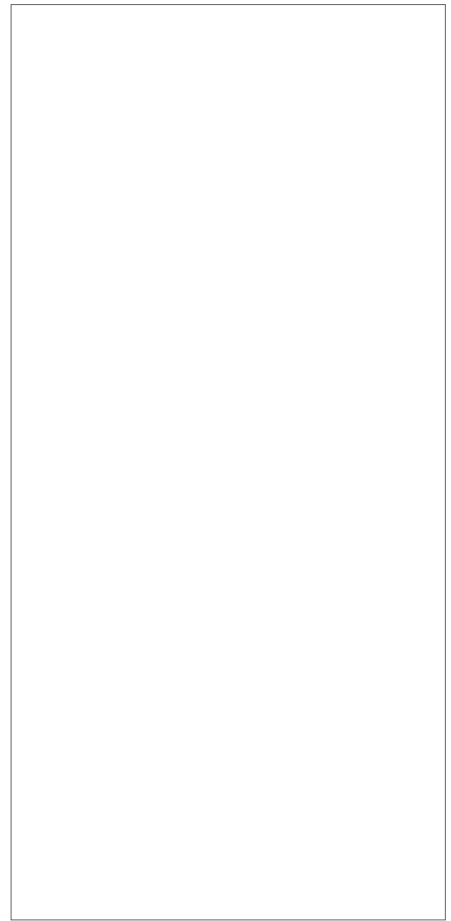

What causes the hoodoo magic?

Rain and melting snow erodes the rocks as it cascades down. A constant cycle of freezing and thawing also works to create wider and wider cracks. Be sure to notice the different colors in the tall structures, which are the result of various mineral layers deposited millions of years ago.
